



LOCAL HISTORY

LARAGH

The village of Laragh in Co. Wicklow gets it's name from the Irish word láithreach meaning a site or place. The name itself dates back to 1601 when it was called 'The Laragh.

Prior to 1845 when a new road was built people had to cross the mountains on foot or else go round via Dublin to get from east to west or from Kildare to the Glendalough area.

Derrybawn House, north of the village, was built in the 18th century and belonged to Mr. James Critchey. It was burned down in 1798 and the present Derybawn House was built by a man named Bookey from which Bookey's Bridge is named. There were at least eleven United Irishmen from around the Laragh area who were among the rebel Michael Dwyer's ablest volunteers. Killafeen is the site of an old church. It is possible that the Abbey of Glendalough had a house of shelter there for travellers in early mediaeval times.

The barracks at Laragh which was built in 1803 as one of a number of such buildings on the Military Road by the British Government. There were one hundred men and a captain stationed here and their job was to suppress the many rebels active in the area.

Many battles have been fought in the district even as late as 1922 when a garrison based at the Royal Hotel in Glendalough was attacked.

CLUB TRAVEL

Rambles in the Rockies

Martin Fagan directed his attentions to the New World this year. Gathering an enthusiastic group of 16 walkers, we headed for the Rocky Mountains in Canada last July for three weeks. We took an 8-hour flight from London direct to Calgary in Alberta. After an overnight here we had a short trip to Ribbon Creek Y.H. in Kananaskis Country, passing the Olympic site en route (The Winter Olympics were held in Calgary in 1988). Kananaskis Country is a Provincial Park and was a wilderness until 1977. Still quite underdeveloped it has a nice non-tourist flavour. Three hikes here — the Ribbon Creek trail, the Centennial Route to Mount Allan (9550 ft.), and Old Baldy Mountain. Unfortunately, we failed to reach any of our destinations as the weather was too hot (between 27°C and 35°C). However, the alpine meadows on the Centennial Trail were delightful — a feast of flowers, some familiar such as asters, harebells and aquilegias, but also the extraordinary Indian Paintbrush, a most vivid red flower. Next port-of-call was Banff. The after our arrival here was White Water Rafting Day — a memarable highlight. A long bus trip took us to the wonderfully-named Kicking Horse River. We

orable highlight. A long bus trip took us to the wonderfully-named Kicking Horse River. We were fitted out with suitable gear and headed down river on a 2-hour journey. It was terrific

fun and not dangerous.

After some local walks in Banff (Sulphur Mountain and Mount Sanson), we travelled to Lake Louise – a gorgeous turquoise lake. The trek up to the Plains of the six Glaciers was dramatic, terminating on the rim of a major lateral moraine. We were prevented from exploring the slopes of Mount Whitethorn as there were reports of grizzly bears in the area! On to Edith Cavell Hostel near Jasper for one night. It is quite remote and facilities were basic but it was very homely. No drinking water, so water from a nearby pipe had to be boiled. The good news was that a fridge and two sets of lamps were delivered just before we arrived – operated on bottled gas. The popular walk here is to the handsome Angel Glacier. The trail ended at the Cavell Meadows, via another lateral moraine. An encounter with a moose enlivened our return journey, whilst others spotted a woodpecker in their travels. Compared to the Irish mountains, where one sees little wild life, Canada is very rewarding as we came across blue jays, chipmunks, bighorn sheep, coyotes, deer, etc.

In Maligne Canyon a few miles from Jasper we walked the full length of the canyon on our first evening. Next morning, I succumbed to an accumulation of mosquito bites and spent the day at Jasper Hospital getting medical attention. Everyone in the party suffered from bites to

a greater or lesser extent during the holiday.

An amusing incident occurred at this hostel, where a Canadian hosteller strangely left his contact lenses overnight in a mug on the kitchen table. Next morning he came looking for them and found one of them lying at the bottom of the mug from which I had just drunk some orange juice. One can guess where the other lens disappeared to! Some witty colleagues seemed to think my eyesight had suddenly improved!

From Jasper International Hostel we had treks to Whistler Mountain, the Marmot Basin and a rest day in the grounds of the elegant Jasper Park Lodge, engaging in horse-riding, canoeing

and pedal-boating and some easy hiking.

Homeward bound with a two-night stop at Beauty Creek – a tiny hostel with no running water a la Edith Cavell, but it is superbly situated on the banks of the Sunwapta River.

Back to Calgary via Banff. We had a full day there so we got a flavour of this fine city with its towers, skyscrapers, attractive parks and a fine selection of restaurants.

Despite the misadventures with mosquitoes and the excessive heat, it was a most successful trip with the Canadian hospitality being especially memorable.

Memories of buffalo burgers, international camp-fire sing-songs and Kokanee beer will not fade away easily.
