


CLUB TRAVEL

WALKING THE INCA TRAIL IN PERU

We landed in Cuzco at 7am greeted by brilliant sunshine and cold, crystal-clear air. The high altitude made our hearts beat like drums. This was remedied at our *Hostal San Blas*, where we relaxed with several cups of *mate de coca*, which is coca leaves in boiling water, the time-honoured recipe for preventing headaches and altitude sickness. Then we were on our way to the fortress of *Sacsayhuamán* 200m above the city where the festival of *Inti Raymi*, the colourful celebration of the winter solstice, was in progress. And what a sight it was, up to 30,000 people; cooking, eating, drinking and celebrating. The highlight of the day was the re-lighting of the sacred fire on the central stage and the (faked) sacrifice of a llama.

We spent a few days in Cuzco and explored the Sacred Valley of the Incas. Here ruins such as Pisac and Ollantaytambo bear witness to the importance of this fertile valley which still yields a large proportion of Peru's agricultural produce. Cuzco is the starting point of the four-day trek along the Inca trail which eventually leads to the Sacred City of Machu Picchu. We decided to go with a company called "United Mice" (no joke!) and united we were, all 23 of us. The first day's hiking was relatively easy and we camped near a village with a single water tap and cold beer for sale. The second day was the most challenging with 1200 metres to climb before lunch to the aptly named "Dead Woman's Pass" at 4200 metres, followed by a steep descent into the next valley with strange-looking vegetation and another climb up to 3800 metres. That night it started to rain and we had a rather wet morning's hike. By lunchtime, however, the rain stopped and after a moral-boosting cup of mate de coca, we started our descent down to the Inca ruin of Wiñva-Wavna Next morning, we started walking at 5.30 am in order to get to Intipunku, the Sun Gate, just before the sun rises over the mountains and casts its rays over the city of Machu Picchu. As it turned out, the clouds of the previous day had not quite left yet, so there was no sunrise for us. But seeing Machu Picchu for the first time from this familiar picture-postcard angle is spectacular. Both the extraordinary location, perched on a steep wooded peak with the meandering river Urubamba almost turning it into an island, and surrounded by enormous wooded mountains on all sides with higher snow-capped mountains in the distance, the ancient city of the Incas catches everybody's imagination. The mystery of it's construction in the mid-1400s and it's abandonment less than 100 vears later, the fact that the Spanish never got there and its rediscovery by Hiram Bingham in 1911 all add to the fascination. For us, the most impressive buildings were the temples smoothly carved out of bedrock, the water irrigation systems and ritual baths as well as the sacred rocks found in various parts of the city which were carved to resemble the shape of the mountain they are pointing at. After some exploration, we descended into the Urubamba valley and on to Aguas Calientes which consists mainly of a train track with an array of backpackers' hostels, hamburger joints and pizzerias built around it as well as, as the name implies, a hot spring in which the weary hiker can relax his limbs.

A three-week holiday is just long enough to visit most of the interesting sites in the southern half of Peru. Some places worth visiting are the Colca Canyon, supposedly even deeper than the Grand Canyon and a good spot for watching condors; the Convent of Santa Catalina in Arequipa; the islands of Tequile and Amantani on Lake Titicaca where you can stay with local families; the famous Nazca Lines which are best viewed from the air and the guano-covered Islas Ballestas, home to huge colonies of pelicans, boobies and sea lions. People are friendly, the telephone system works, you can buy good quality film and most tour guides speak English. You do have to watch your belongings in Peru, but there is no need to be paranoid; it's common sense to leave passports, tickets and extra cash in the hotel-safe. A return flight Dublin-Lima with Iberia or other airlines will cost from IRP600 to IRP750; you can fly Lima-Cuzco in an hour (IRP60 one-way) or avail of special air passes. As accommodation, food,transport and locally organised tours are quite reasonable, you can expect to spend approx. IRP1200 (in total) and have a very enjoyable holiday.
