


The leader sets the pace of the hike and walkers are expected to obey his/her instructions at all times.

Club Travel

The Coast to Coast Walk - May 2000

This walk was established by the legendary hillwalker, William Wainright and is highly popular. It starts at the small seaside resort of St Bees, in Cumbria near Sellafield and ends at Robin Hood's bay, near Whitby, in North Yorkshire - a distance of approx 300 km /191 miles. Wainright's book on the walk is an astonishing step-by-step account in his own script, including hundreds of drawings and sketch-maps.

The six of us included Monica Caden, Alma Hobson, Garry Byrne, Stephen James, Frank Rooney and Pearse Foley flew to Newcastle and then by train to Carlisle and St Bees. Diarmuid O'Suilleabhan joined us for the first four days through the Lake District. We didn't tackle the highest but crossed some high ridges, providing magnificent panoramas of fells, lakes and distant ridges. We in youth hostels for this part of the journey, all in superb locations with first class facilities, including Ennerdale (a.k.a. High Gillerthwaite), Borrowdale (or Longthwaite) and Patterdale.

Leaving the Lake District, our first B&B was in Shap (New Ing Farm). From there, the route crossed limestone hills, reminiscent of the Burren with creviced pavements, rocky outcrops, stone circles and tumuli. Roman roads were also becoming a feature. Next overnight was at Kirkby Stephen, a handsome market town in an imposing mansion, Redmayne House.

We were now leaving Cumbria and entering North Yorkshire and its dales. Soon we were on the highest summit on the entire route - Nine Standards Rigg (2,171 ft). This peak gets its name from nine individual vertical cairns, dramatically silhouetted against the skyline, marking an important watershed in the Pennines. The scale and isolation of this moorland is so very impressive, despite being marred a little by low flying RAF tornado jets. We spent that night in Keld, a tiny remote village, without even a pub. It's mainly noted for being at the intersection of this walk and the Pennine Way. I had a chastening experience here as the landlady switched off the TV in front of me, announced that she was putting the lights out and that it was time for bed! That last happened to me almost 60 years ago.

We reached Richmond two days later, a beautifully preserved town with its cobbled market square, dominant castle and quaint narrow streets and alleys.

A day off here, so we went to York, taking in the Minster and castle. Here as everywhere on our trip -town, village, countryside - no litter - not a plastic bag anywhere.

The final section was across the Cleveland Hills and the North Yorkshire moors -appealed most to me. About 1,000 ft above sea level, it was an almost unbroken ridge for two days - 38 miles, with gentle gradients, distant views and not a wall or fence in sight. It rained most of the second day but there were two highlights - the Lion Inn, a wonderful refuge at the top of a mountain and a surreal moment when a man with a car met us (and others) at an isolated roadside spot with cups of tea and coffee. That night was spent in Glaisdale and then a final celebratory stretch to Robin Hood's Bay next day.

A walk to be warmly recommended. There was a great camaraderie to be found amongst all the walkers we encountered.

Finally, the cost. The exchange rate was very poor @ 72p sterling to IEP £1. Hostels were £12 sterling/night. B&Bs ranged from £16 to £25 sterling. Return flight was IEP £85, trains and buses £55 sterling. Luggage was carried forward for £3.75 per day. Pub dinners, which were good, were about £6 each evening. Overall, including spending money the trip came to about £800. But can you put a price on treasured memories?

Dublin/ Wicklow Mountain Rescue

.We need Your Club's Help!

Each year the Dublin/Wicklow Mountain Rescue Team responds to approximately 50 incidents in the mountains of Counties Louth, Dublin and Wicklow. The cost of providing this service is about £20,000 per annum, of which approximately £7,500 comes from the State. the balance is raised through street collections and other fundraising events.

The potential of a street collection in Dublin City is pretty unlimited, provided we have the collectors. Each person we have on the street is worth around £100 in terms of monies collected.

We have a Street Collection in the City area on Saturday 14th October next. We need as many collectors as possible!

I would ask you to circulate this request around your club members, and ask them to support us by volunteering to collect for us on that day, we need to get some idea of numbers in advance (so that we can have permits etc, and "pitches" organised in advance). However, volunteers on the day will be very welcome, so long as we can verify

Basically, the plan is this: we will have a Base set up on the centre island in O'Connell Street, from 08.30 am on the 14th. Collectors should arrive anytime after that, to collect their box, and be assigned a "pitch". When the collector has finished/has to leave, he/she returns the box etc to the base in O'Connell Street.

We would be grateful for any time commitment.....even a few hours would be a great help.

So, please publicise this event, and see if your club could supply some collectors for us. Remember, we need the funds to provide the service to those who use the hills......
