


NOTE: The leader has the right to refuse anyone who is not adequately equipped (i.e. without adequate rainwear, spare clothes, food, torch and hiking boots). The leader has the right to extend, curtail or alter the route from that described in the program. The leader sets the pace of the hike and walkers are expected to obey his/her instructions at all times.



During winter months it is essential to bring a (head) torch on all Sunday hikes and weekends away. Don't forget to check your batteries and bulb.

## Hiking In Japan

I had such wonderful experiences of walking in Japan in 1997 and 1998 that I was really looking forward to hiking again in the Japanese Alps. Japanese people worship the simple beauty of nature and arrange trees, flowers and stones to make their environment look even more attractive.

My first walk had everything to fulfil my adventurous desire in summer 97:

Having escaped the security of a well kept Japanese city we moved into the unpredictable and stifling jungle. We started in Mino at the foot of steep mountains (where Kobe's suburban sprawl ends) and climbed quite high up to get to a small temple. Before we finished this hike we accidentally startled away a black and yellow snake baking in the sun on the footpath, saw several cheeky monkeys and also a fascinating leaf looking insect called a praying mantis - not to mention some terrific species of mosquito and spider!

This year's walk was far less audacious although very enjoyable and full of interesting encounters. We arrived at Kansai International Airport, Osaka on 30th April. We stayed at Reiko's parents' house in Tsutsujigaoka, a new residential area outside Nabari. Reiko's parents sold their apartment Osaka where housing prices are very high - even more than in Dublin, and bought a new comfortable and spacious house in the "country side" (depends on one's point of view) to enjoy their retirement.

We arranged an appointment with a small group of hikers from a club called "Kansai Ramblers", then met them at Akame station and got a bus to the foot of the nearby mountains, where the stream (Takigawa) finishes its terrific journey down the mountain slope.

A series of shops along the road offer sushi, that can be carried along to eat later as lunch (O-Bento), and also sell various souvenirs. A little museum at the beginning of the footpath showed the magnificent flora and fauna, found near the riverbed, and indigenous to the region.

The highlight was unarguably a big dead Japanese salamander kept in a jar of formalin preservative. It was reputed to be the first salamander implanted with false teeth. The batrachian, unable to chew food, was saved from an almost certain death by Japanese scientists who transplanted the teeth. It was amusing to see a black and white picture of the group of surgeons grinning with glee after the successful operation.

After this lesson in culture, we set off and started to follow the banks of the Takigawa (literally the river of the waterfalls) from which one can marvel at the 48 waterfalls (more than that actually). At this time of year many Japanese take their holidays (Golden Week). Consequently there was a veritable procession of people climbing the stairs.

We stopped several times to take in the beauty of the nicest waterfalls, to take some pictures, and to have our lunch under the spray of one of them. Words do not describe the beauty of the scene.

Each waterfall has a unique name, here are a few samples: 100 Tatami Sized Rock Waterfall / Hyaku-jo Iwa, 7 Colored-rock Waterfall / Nana-shoku Iwa, Couple's Waterfall / Meoto Daki, Skeleton Waterfall / Gaikotsu Daki, Motionless Waterfall / Fudo Daki...

By the time we got back to "base camp" I had become well acquainted with my fellow hikers. Before leaving them at the station, we exchanged e-mail addresses and expressed the hope of meeting again in the future. "What about doing this again next year during the blossom season" was one such suggestion I overheard.

## Euro Ramblers Rally - Strasbourg 23 - 30.09.2001

The European Ramblers Association (ERA), The French Ramblers Association and the Vosges-Club have organised the Euro Ramblers Rally 2001, a major event gathering thousands of hikers coming along ten routes leading to Strasbourg. Members of various national associations from the 23 ERA countries willalternately take turns carrying "relay batons" as symbols of European unity along the European routes to Strasbourg during the period from May 2000 to the end of September 2001.

The event culminates in a week long programme from 23-30 September 2001 including a symposium on the preservation and protection of the European hiking trails, the congress of the ERA plus an interesting hiking programme for all levels in the Vosges Mountains, Alsace and the Black Forest.
